

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

### engineering students build electric vehicles



This past summer the technology department purchased Infento kits to be used in Mr. Tappin's Principles of Engineering class and Mr. Krucher's Transportation Systems class in the high school. The kits allow students to create a variety of projects such as Archimedes screws, cranes, push powered vehicles like scooters and electric powered vehicles. The Engineering students first built a push powered wiggle scooter. After completing the wiggle scooters, the students moved onto the more difficult electric vehicles. The class is working in three different groups. Each group is working on a different electric vehicle (Hot Rod, Buster Go-Kart and Minibike). The kits also allow students to design custom vehicles and projects to solve design challenges. A student in Mr. Tappin's Engineering class who built the Minibike was quoted as saying "This project is extremely hands on, engaging, super fun and a most enjoyable project. More students are going to be interested in taking these classes when they see the projects we make".



Students in Mr. Izzo's Honors Precalculus class recently completed their conic

sections project. The assignment was to create a logo or picture using the mathematical equations of parabolas, ellipses, circles, hyperbolas, and lines. First, students made a rough draft of the design and equations on a graph. Then they had to delve deep into difficult algebra to manipulate the equations and position them correctly into the graphing calculator – some with as many as 45 equations. # RANK ONE

We are moving to an online platform, Rank One for athletic paperwork/physicals this year. I hope in doing this, it will be more convenient for the parents as well as the coaches. Please see below the step by step instructions on how to ensure your child is eligible to participate in sports this upcoming 2022-2023 school year.

### Online Forms (rankonesport.com)

- To access the online forms, select "Proceed to Online Forms" below.
- You will then be prompted to create a Parent Account or Continue as Guest to complete the online forms.
- Click HERE (PowerPoint instructions online) for instructions on how to create a Parent Account.

• In order to complete the forms, you may be asked to provide your student's ID number and/or Date of Birth along with other demographic information.

- If you have any questions, please contact the athletic department.
- 2. All Athletes must complete the electronic forms to be cleared for sports participation: The required forms are Athletes Contract, Emergency Contact and Health History. An email confirmation upon the successful submission of each form will be sent directly to you.
- 3. It will be necessary to provide a hard copy of the Physical Examination form to the Nurse in the school your child attends. Physical examination forms must be dated and signed by a physician. Physicals must be completed after June 1, 2022 for the 2022-2023 school year. All other documents can be completed electronically.

Please allow approximately four days for the nurse to clear your child for participation.
